"SECTION 6. IC 5-1.2-11.5-9 IS ADDED TO THE INDIANA CODE AS A NEW SECTION TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2019]: **Sec. 9. (a) The authority shall coordinate the executive branch activities related to the state's water programs. The authority's duties under this section include the following:**

**(1) Serving as the executive branch coordinator of water related programs and activities of the state.**

**(2) Advising state agencies and political subdivisions, and coordinating their activities, regarding best practices concerning the best use of funding streams and incentives in the manner most likely to achieve comprehensive water related data collection and regional collaboration in water and wastewater service.**

**(3) Promoting and coordinating the collection and sharing of information throughout Indiana concerning water and wastewater service.**

**(4) Providing leadership regarding investment, affordability, supply, and economic development related to water and wastewater service.**

**(b) All instrumentalities, agencies, authorities, boards, and commissions of the state, including the management performance hub established by IC 4-3-26, shall cooperate with and provide assistance to the authority in carrying out the authority's duties under this section.**

**(c) In carrying out the authority's duties under this section, the authority shall use any data the authority acquires in a manner that:**

**(1) protects the confidential information of individual water utilities and customers; and**  
**(2) is consistent with IC 5-14-3-4."**

Page 1, between lines 12 and 13, begin a new paragraph and insert:

"SECTION 2. IC 4-4-37-7, AS AMENDED BY P.L.202-2016, SECTION 2, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2019]: Sec. 7. (a) The office may award a grant to a person who submits plans for the preservation or rehabilitation of historic property and obtains the certifications required under section 8 of this chapter.

(b) The maximum amount of a grant awarded under this section is equal to ~~thirty-five~~ **fifty** percent ~~(35%)~~ **(50%)** of the qualified expenditures, not to exceed one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000), that:

(1) the person makes for the preservation or rehabilitation of historic property; and

(2) are approved by the office.

(c) Each grant shall be made under a grant agreement by and between the office and the person receiving the grant. The grant agreement must include all of the following:

(1) A timeline for completing the project, including milestones that the person commits to achieving by the time specified.

(2) The approved plans for the preservation or rehabilitation of the historic property.

(3) The estimated cost of the preservation or rehabilitation of the historic property and all sources of money for the project.

(4) The financing plan by the person proposing the project.

(5) The remedies available to the office if the grant is made and the project does not substantially comply with the proposed plan approved under this chapter.

(6) Any other terms or conditions the office considers appropriate."

**House Resolution 27**

Representative Frye introduced House Resolution 27:

A HOUSE RESOLUTION memorializing Rising Sun Police Chief David Paul Hewitt.

*Whereas, Rising Sun Police Chief David Paul Hewitt was born on April 9, 1969, to Paul and Rosalie "Rosie" Hewitt;*

*Whereas, Chief Hewitt passed away on February 13, 2019, at the age of 49;*

*Whereas, Chief Hewitt graduated from Rising Sun High School, and from Vincennes University with a law enforcement degree;*

*Whereas, Chief Hewitt began his law enforcement career in 1991 as a Switzerland County Sheriff's Deputy;*

*Whereas, Chief Hewitt was hired at the Rising Sun Police Department in 1998 and became the first ever full time investigator;*

*Whereas, Chief Hewitt was recognized for his hard work and devotion to public safety and was promoted to the rank of sergeant;*

*Whereas, Chief Hewitt became Police Chief in 2004;*

*Whereas, Chief Hewitt worked with the Switzerland County Sheriff's Office, Dearborn County Sheriff's Department, and the Lawrenceburg Police Department successfully for many years;*

*Whereas, Chief Hewitt was an outdoorsman and enjoyed hunting, fishing, archery, and sketching nature and the landscapes around him;*

*Whereas, Chief Hewitt was the Vice President, and was soon to be elected President, of the Compton Traditional Bowhunters organization;*

*Whereas, Chief Hewitt married his high school sweetheart and was a loving father and stepfather to his daughter, Olivia Jane; son, David Andrew; and children Jake and Sydney Taylor;*

*Whereas, He worked tirelessly to give his children a childhood that was full of fond memories and a love for the outdoors;*

*Whereas, He raised his children to trust one another, live with humility, and respect themselves and others; and*

*Whereas, Chief Hewitt was born and raised in Southern Indiana and spent his life making his family and community a better place: Therefore,*

*Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:*

SECTION 1. That the Indiana House of Representatives honors the memory of Rising Sun Police Chief David Paul Hewitt.

SECTION 2. That the Principal Clerk of the House of Representatives shall transmit copies of this resolution to the family of Police Chief David Paul Hewitt.

**House Resolution 28**

Representative Karickhoff introduced House Resolution 28:

A HOUSE RESOLUTION recognizing the F&AM Masonic Lodge #341 in Greentown, Indiana.

*Whereas, Indiana has over 50,000 Masons in almost 400 lodges throughout the state representing men from all walks of life;*

*Whereas, Admission to a Masonic lodge is open to men of good character and faith, regardless of their race, color, religious beliefs, political views, sexual orientation, physical ability, citizenship, or national origin;*

*Whereas, The Greentown F&AM Masonic Lodge #341 was originally chartered on May 29, 1867;*

*Whereas, The first master of the Greentown lodge, Mr. Arland O. D. Kelley, was appointed in 1866;*

*Whereas, The first lodge building was purchased in 1872 and membership grew exponentially after a neighboring lodge, Jerome Lodge #203, surrendered its charter in 1884;*

*Whereas, The Masons of the Greentown F&AM Masonic Lodge #341 have met continuously for over 125 years and have been an integral part of Greentown and the surrounding community;*

*Whereas, The lodge building served as a school for children from 1919 to 1920 while a new school was being built in the area;*

*Whereas, The Freemasons of Greentown started a scholarship program for students at Eastern High School in 2004 and have since awarded scholarships to 30 young adults totaling over \$50,000;*

*Whereas, Freemasonry is the world's first, largest, and most legendary fraternal organization, providing guidance and leadership to Masons to become better husbands, fathers, brothers, and citizens; and*

*Whereas, The Freemasons of Greentown continue to make positive change in the communities that they serve: Therefore,*

*Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:*

SECTION 1. That the Indiana House of Representatives recognizes the Greentown F&AM Masonic Lodge #341 for its many years of contributions to the community.

SECTION 2. That the Principal Clerk of the House of Representatives shall transmit copies of this resolution to Indiana State Representative Michael Karickhoff for distribution.

### **House Resolution 29**

Smith, Pryor, Fleming and Steuerwald introduced House Resolution 29:

A HOUSE RESOLUTION celebrating International Women's Day and recognizing the essential role of women in history during Women's History Month.

*Whereas, The 19th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution was passed by Congress on June 4, 1919, and was ratified by the states on August 18, 1920;*

*Whereas, A U.S. Supreme Court decision was needed to ensure that women could vote throughout the country, and 97 years ago, on February 27, 1922, the U.S. Supreme Court upheld the 19th Amendment, guaranteeing that the right to vote*

*could not be denied based on sex. Leser v. Garnett ensured that no matter what any state constitution said, women could vote;*

*Whereas, American women were leaders in securing their own rights of suffrage and equal opportunity, but were also leaders in the abolitionist movement, the emancipation movement, the industrial labor movement, the civil rights movement, and the peace movement, helping to create a fairer and more just society for all;*

*Whereas, The first International Women's Day (IWD) gathering was held in 1911 and was supported by over a million people in Austria, Denmark, Germany, and Switzerland after many years of campaigns for women's equality;*

*Whereas, Less than a week later, on March 25th, the tragic "Triangle Fire" in New York City took the lives of more than 140 working women, most of them immigrants. This drew significant attention to working conditions and labor legislation in the United States that became a focus of subsequent IWD events;*

*Whereas, IWD has grown and belongs to all groups collectively everywhere. It does not belong to any specific country, group, or organization, and is celebrated annually on March 8th;*

*Whereas, IWD is a global day celebrating the social, economic, cultural, and political achievements of women. The day also marks a call to action for accelerating gender parity. The theme for International Women's Day for 2019 is "Better the Balance, Better the World" and many notable women have exemplified this. We remember a few here;*

*Whereas, Marie Curie was born in 1867 and founded the science of radioactivity, which led to the discovery of various cures for cancer. She was the first woman to win a Nobel Prize, the first female professor at the University of Paris, and the first person to win a second Nobel Prize;*

*Whereas, Rosa Parks challenged the racial segregation that existed in many parts of the country by refusing to give up her seat on a bus to a white man. The United States Congress has called her "the first lady of civil rights" and "the mother of the freedom movement";*

*Whereas, Amelia Earhart became the first female pilot to cross the Atlantic Ocean during a solo flight. She spent five years beating speed and flying records, and was subsequently declared missing after making an attempt to fly solo over the Pacific Ocean;*

*Whereas, Grace Hopper was the first woman to earn a Ph.D. in math from Yale University in 1934 and became a revolutionary figure in the world of computer science. She spent the majority of her life serving her country as part of the U.S. Navy and is credited with visionary work on early computer systems that led to COBOL, a commercial programming language that revolutionized how businesses operate around the world;*

*Whereas, Bessie Coleman was the first woman to earn an international pilot's license in France but could only work as a stunt pilot in the U.S. due to racial and gender bias. She succeeded in building nationwide support to fund a pilot school that trained black aviators;*

*Whereas, Carrie Chapman Catt served as president of the National American Woman Suffrage Association (NAWSA) over 100 years ago from 1900 to 1904. She served again from 1915 through the passage of the 19th Amendment in 1920, 99 years ago;*

*Whereas, Alice Paul broke away from NAWSA and founded the National Woman's Party (NWP). She organized parades and pickets of the White House starting in 1913 and joined 1,000*

*"silent sentinels" in support of suffrage in January 1917. Paul and fellow suffragettes with banners picketed the White House gates over the course of the next 18 months;*

*Whereas, Dr. Alice Hamilton became the first and, for many years, the only woman on the Harvard faculty in 1918. While teaching pathology at Northwestern University, she came to know Jane Addams and other reformers who encouraged her to find a way to apply her scientific knowledge to social problems. Her pioneering research in the field of toxicology raised awareness about industrial hazards found in the workplace for many Americans;*

*Whereas, Dr. Mae Jemison was the first African American woman in space. She had previously served as an Area Peace Corps Medical Officer and managed the health care systems for Sierra Leone and Liberia in West Africa. She was selected by NASA for the astronaut program in 1988 and was chosen as the science mission specialist for an eight-day mission on board the Endeavour in 1992, logging over 190 hours in space;*

*Whereas, The late State Representative and State Senator, Anita Bowser of Michigan City, Indiana, was the first woman to hold the role of Deputy Speaker Pro Tempore in the history of Indiana. She was a founding member of, and the first female teacher at, Purdue University North Central. Her priorities included education, economic development, health care, and the environment, and she was considered by some to be "the conscience of the Indiana State Senate";*

*Whereas, Sgt. Nora Werner is a Michigan City native and the first female Indiana State Police trooper to patrol the Indiana Toll Road. Sgt. Werner emphasized doing the right thing "no matter what" and served as a mentor and role model for many state troopers until her retirement in 2017 after serving for 34 years;*

*Whereas, Dorothy Journey was born in Michigan City in 1909 and began her career at the Michigan City News, later becoming the women's editor at the Miami Herald, Detroit Free Press, and Philadelphia Inquirer. She shifted the focus of women's pages from society news to serious issues, such as the women's movement, female political candidates, and women in the workplace;*

*Whereas, Anita King was born in Michigan City in 1884 and began her career in modeling and theater, learned to drive, and competed in auto races in the early 1910s. She was the first female driver to complete a solo trip across the United States, reporting that her only companions were a rifle and a six-shooter. She used her fame for charitable works, and helped organize a recreation club for young girls trying to start a career in the film industry;*

*Whereas, Harriet Colfax, who was the lighthouse keeper in Michigan City, served from her appointment in 1861 until her retirement at age 80 in 1904. She retained an impeccable service record during her 43 years of rain, snow, and many storms, never allowing the light to fail; and*

*Whereas, Recognizing and celebrating the accomplishments of women in history may inspire future generations to work toward equality for all Hoosiers: Therefore,*

*Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:*

SECTION 1. That the Indiana House of Representatives: recognizes the achievements of these and many other remarkable and tenacious women who have led the way for others; celebrates the social, economic, cultural, and political

achievements of women, because visibility and awareness help drive positive change for women; recognizes and honors the women in the U.S. and in other countries who have fought and continue to struggle for gender equality and women's rights; thanks the members of the Indiana Commission for Women and the individual Commissions for Women serving in several cities in Indiana for their efforts in support of women; and encourages women to run for elected office and apply to serve on boards and commissions.

SECTION 2. That the Indiana House of Representatives celebrates the month of March as Women's History Month and March 8, 2019, as International Women's Day in the state of Indiana.

The resolution was read a first time and adopted by voice vote.
